UEP 225-01 COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT: Strategies, Methods, Examples



DESCRIPTION

The best planning projects and public policies succeed when the communities they are intended for are engaged in shaping them. This course explores ways to create active, positive participation in different settings. We examine the goals and practice of community engagement, from theory and history to methods and techniques. Using case studies of participation processes in Cambridge and Boston, we interview process designers and facilitators for their assessment of how effective the process was. Readings include scholarly articles, book chapters, online articles and blogs, websites, and web-based engagement platforms.



LEARNING OBJECTIVES

Through this course, it is expected that you will

- I) gain an understanding of
 - the history, goals, and measures of success of community engagement processes;
 - the methods and techniques used in practice for engaging community members in policies, plans, projects and decisions that affect them;
- 2) observe and analyze case studies of community engagement processes;
- 3) use critical thinking to develop your own assessment of what works and doesn't work under different conditions and purposes of engagement;
- 4) design a process of public participation for a setting and topic of your choice.

STRUCTURE

- In-person **class sessions**, on Tuesdays, from 6 pm to 9 pm (EST) in Tisch 310. Most classes will run for two hours. The three-hour periods are for guest speakers and student presentations.
- **Readings** are posted on Canvas, and include academic and online articles, online book chapters, reports, and websites. You are expected to do the readings each week in advance of the class at which they are discussed.
- Each week, two **postings** are due at **Discussions** by Tuesday at 3 pm: 1) your observations about the readings and 2) a comment on another student's observations,. Observations are 2-3 paragraphs of your thoughts about the readings, in response to a prompt posted at the Discussion board.
- Office hours can be scheduled by email and held in person in Brown House or through Zoom.

REQUIREMENTS

• Class Participation

Attend 14 online class sessions and participate in the discussion. Some sessions will be led by students, who will be asked in advance to take on a particular topic.

Discussion Boards

Post your observations about the readings, and a comment on another student's observations, by 3 pm on Tuesdays.

• Short Papers

Submit three short papers (2 to 3 pages) on Fridays by midnight (11:59 pm). The short papers are personal reflections and critical thinking about the material, what you have learned in the previous weeks, and how it connects to your personal and/or professional life.

• Draft and Final Project

The major work of the course is a community engagement project that you design. You present your draft in class on 10/25, post it at Assignments on Friday 10/28, and your final is due on Friday 12/16. The project is described below.

Community Engagement Project

Design a community engagement for a setting and topic of your choice. Identify the location, project issues, stakeholders, engagement methods and techniques, expected outcomes and measures of success. The project is an opportunity for you to apply the course material to locations, institutions, planning processes or policy areas that you know or want to explore. The two most important questions to think about are how to identify and reach out to all stakeholders, and what are the measures of success of the engagement process.
